

#### **Senior Pastor Report**

I pray this report finds each of you doing well and experiencing the blessings of God. As I look back over the past year I am in awe of the glorious nature of our Triune God. Through all our experiences, both good and bad, God continues to shower us with God's love and grace. God continues to be faithful to God's promises and word. God continues to make a way where there seems to be no way, and God continues to be the same yesterday, today, and tomorrow. In short, God continues to be God!

2022 has been a year of transition for me in my role as one of the pastors of AHUMC. I started the year as the Pastor of Mission & Outreach, but with the pastoral appointment of Rev. Dinah Shelly to Spring Creek UMC, I accepted the position of Modern Worship Preaching Pastor in July of this year. I am thankful that the Mission & Outreach position was filled by my dear friend and colleague, Rev. Janet Weatherston.

The month prior to starting in the CLC, the Modern Worship service went from two services each Sunday to one. Over the past six months we have had an increase in Sunday morning worship from an average of 62 people in June to an average 74 in November, not including online worshipers. Our focus is on worshiping God in spirit and in truth and proclaiming the liberating, transformational gospel message of Jesus Christ. We also give attention to responding to the will of God in our lives by being the hands and feet of Christ in the world.

It is a great joy and privilege for me to serve in this capacity, and I look forward to all that God will do in the future. I am thankful to work with such an amazing team of individuals who love God and people with authenticity. Praise be to God!

As an elder in the Rio Texas Conference, I also serve outside the local church. I am currently on the Board of Ordained Ministry, the District Strategy Team, the Board of Directors for the Wesley Foundation of San Antonio (Campus Ministry), and in 2023 I will join the Board of Directors for Project Transformation of San Antonio.

Over the past year I have participated in a cohort group (Courageous Leadership Initiative) sponsored by the Texas Methodist Foundation. The group meets quarterly and is comprised of pastors from the South-Central Jurisdiction. The focus of the group is to address ministry issues and to learn from one another. I also participate monthly in an accountability group with three other pastors from the Rio Texas Conference. It is an opportunity to hold each other accountable, to pray for each other, and to ask the very important question, how is it with your soul?

#### 2022 Charge Conference Report - Rev. Donna Strieb

I am most grateful to continue serving on staff at Alamo Heights UMC, and to have done so since 1980. As Pastor of Spiritual Formation, I focus on three primary areas...teaching, worship, and ministry with senior adults. Ministries include:

- Teaching a hybrid *Thursday Morning Class* with 30-35 class participants attending in person and on Zoom. In the spring we studied Danielle Shroyer's book, *Where Jesus Prayed*, and this fall we used Adam Hamilton's *The Journey: Walking to Way to Bethlehem*.
- Assisting as part of the clergy team teaching the 2022 Confirmation Class. I taught the session on John Wesley, the Methodist Movement, and history of Alamo Heights United Methodist Church.
- Leading the monthly *Taizé* prayer services on the first Wednesday of the month that are offered both in person and via livestream.
- Serving as liturgist in the traditional worship services each week.
- Creating occasional altarscapes or visuals for special days.
- Serving as staff liaison with our *Thursday Lunch Bunch* for senior adults. This ministry provides fellowship and a hot meal for seniors, the majority of whom are not members of AHUMC. This past November, we began hosting a group of 22 persons from the program for special needs young adults Reaching Maximum Independence. This was made possible by a grant from the Las Misiones District.
- Serving as the staff liaison with the Chancel Guild that prepares the sanctuary for special holy days and the seasons of the Christian Year.
- Offering pastoral care as needed, including officiating at 12 funerals and occasionally visiting hospitals.

Plans for 2023 include continuing and strengthening the above ministries, and faithfully serving Christ at Alamo Heights United Methodist Church.

## Darrell Smith, Pastor of Discipleship and Communications 2022

2022 has been both a year of difficult change and a year of new growth. At the end of 2021, our Communications Department lost its director, Ryan Kuecks, and its graphic designer, Emily Cleveland, as they moved to new jobs in new cities.

Beginning in late December, we built a new Communications Team with the generous help of congregant and non-profit communications consultant John Burnam. We hired Sarah Smith as graphic designer and brand manager, Cristian Ortiz as digital content coordinator, and expanded the job description of A/V Coordinator Adam Crowell to include video editing and production as our Multimedia Storyteller. We were also able to develop and fill two college internship positions in the areas of printing and technology. We are incredibly blessed to have the Communications Team we have been able to build this year. Each team member carries unique expertise, experience, and a calling to serve—they each work diligently and dutifully together as a team to help our congregation and community.

In addition to responding to the communication needs of the congregation throughout the year, our Communications Team in 2022 undertook an initiative to build healthy communications systems, standards, and practices at AHUMC. That initiative—to bring clarity and consistency to both internal and external communication—will continue in 2023 as we complete our first year as a team and build on all we are learning from our congregation and each other. We hope to add two new college internships in the areas of design and website editing in 2023.

Our year in adult learning and discipleship continued in the recognition that disciples are not mass-produced, and they are not created with the flip of a switch. Living into the life of a disciple—someone who lives out the love and teaching of Jesus the Christ—takes time. In fact, the process of living as a disciple is a lifetime endeavor that requires lots of space and lots of love. It is our hope that our efforts in discipleship formation continue to be reflective of both the time and space needed for discipleship as well as our scriptural and historical tradition.

We continue to develop and offer educational and dialogical opportunities within the community of faith that encourage, edify, sustain, and call forth disciples. In January of 2022, AHUMC began the semester by hosting nine unique, staff-led courses including a church-wide, six-week study of *Where Jesus Prayed* led by the entire pastoral staff.

We launched our fall semester in late August with seven new staff-led courses, ranging from six to fourteen weeks in length. Throughout the year, all AHUMC's

course offerings are free to any interested participants. Moreover, all our courses are offered both in-person and online.

Our efforts to survey the hundreds of participants who engaged one of AHUMC courses in 2022 garnered over 150 completed online surveys. Survey respondents overwhelmingly affirmed our efforts to provide for both the education and connection of disciples.

- 93% of respondents indicated that they had recommended AHUMC's courses to someone else or would in the future.
- 94% of respondents reported that their participation in the course had led to new relationships and connection with others.
- 92% of respondents attributed their course participation to encouraging them as a disciple of Jesus the Christ.
- 91% of respondents rated their overall experience of a course at AHUMC as positive.

AHUMC is committed to offering a wide array of opportunities for the education, encouragement, and equipping of disciples. The spring semester of 2022 will feature another roster of eight staff-led courses. Opportunities for discipleship connection, study, and growth at AHUMC are not limited, however, to educational opportunities alone. We continue to support Sunday school classes, study groups, support groups, and recovery groups at AHUMC. In addition to providing resource and communication support to these groups, we also help our groups and classes adapt to the hybrid environment of meeting in-person and online simultaneously. It is our hope to continue supporting our existing groups as well as creating an encouraging environment for the foundation of new ones.

AHUMC also continues to serve as one of the host communities for The Foundry—a conference initiative toward young adults. Our pastors and worship leaders have provided teaching, worship, and support to The Foundry. We also anticipate being a hosting campus for the Foundry again in 2023. We are grateful to staff members Kacey Brewer and A.J. Navarro, as well as volunteers Jordan and Colin Bryant, for providing leadership in The Foundry community.

2022 has been a year of growth and transformation. Our community is blessed with a steadfast and strong group of disciples who recognize their training as calling them to inner work, love, and action.

I have been the Mission and Outreach Pastor since July 2022. My first task was becoming aware of the different outreach opportunities available at AHUMC. I have thoroughly enjoyed meeting people and learning about their passion and areas of ministry in the church.

I meet regularly with the Mission and Outreach Task Force group to learn about different ministries and what is needed. We had a very successful Pumpkin Patch which raised \$17,000.00 to be donated to area community ministries. The Hope Center reopened to in-person appointments on the first of November. The Hope Center offers monetary help with a client's bill and provides food for people in need.

We made Blessing Bags for the houseless after Emmy talked to her mother about wanting to help the people in need of food. We made Emmy's Blessing Bags and offered them to anyone in the congregation who desired to take one to bless someone in need.

I have worked closely with the Wesley Nurse, Sonia Serna Gonzalez. We regularly go to San Pedro Ave., where the Asylum Seekers building is located, to see if we might offer the people there hope for the journey. We have taken clothes, shoes, and underwear. We have provided prayer and resources to the people we have met.

We currently have a Manger Drive for Advent. We will collect different items in the Manger each week of Advent. These items will be given to area people in need. We have built our first bunk bed prototype for children who do not have a bed to sleep on. We are hoping to create more bunks beds in the spring of 2023.

My hope for 2023 is to begin to create the foundational team for the Mission Central Outreach for our church area. We will seek the Lord through prayer, fasting, and meeting together.

Mission Central is a continuation of the ministries begun at Asbury Church.

I have continued to progress in my education and have completed two classes at SMU since July. I am involved in a Missional Cohort with Rio Texas pastors. I have helped in the Sunday Worship Services. I shared a message in the Community Life Center. I have also led a weekly class on Tuesday Mornings.

I am thankful for the opportunity to be the Mission and Outreach Pastor at AHUMC. There are many opportunities ahead of us to meet the needs of the people we encounter daily.

## 2022 Congregational Care - Charge Conference Report

2022 has once again been a fruitful year at AHUMC as we offer spiritual, mental, and emotional support to our community. We have continued to assess the care needs and seek to meet them at Alamo Heights United Methodist Church. We continue with the vision to carry forth the words of John Wesley in "caring for one another in love." Our church membership is large.

As our church communication systems improve, our ability to communicate our needs and coordinate support for those in need improves with it. Our church members and the wider community are increasingly able to easily notify the church when care is needed.

Our church continues to offer care to our community in many different ways. We stay in contact with members who are isolated due to various ailments. We visit those in hospitals. We offer support for those with long-term needs. We offer pastoral and lay care to those grieving. We travel with communion. We offer spiritual counseling. We are connected with professional counselors with many different specialties. We pray for the healing of our people and our world.

John and Priscilla MacDougall continue to offer their vast experience in counseling to our church at no cost to those that need help. Additionally, Priscilla has been trained by Prepare/Enrich and offers premarital counseling to many of the couples that wed in our church.

We are also looking forward to welcoming Donna Nicolson to practice therapy at AHUMC. Donna is a former staff member and a recent graduate with a master's in clinical therapy. Through Hill Country Wellness, Donna will offer professional counseling in our building both to our membership and the wider community.

Rev. Donna Martin continues to offer a communion service at the Forum next-door to the church. The Forum is an assisted living facility, and many of the residents there are unable to travel to church. The service Rev. Martin leads has grown to an average of 40 participants weekly.

Our recovery ministry continues strong. Through the Recovery Ministry, AHUMC now hosts 6 different 12-Step Recovery Fellowships. Included are Alcoholics Anonymous, Debtors Anonymous, Adult Children of Alcoholics and Dysfunctional Families, Sexaholics Anonymous, Sex and Love Addicts Anonymous, and our own Pioneer Group. These groups hold 11 meetings per week in the West Wing. Weekly attendance is between 125 and 150 people.

Our church hosted 15 weddings at AHUMC this year. We also offered support, training, and counseling to a number of weddings off campus.

Finally, Rev. Ryan Jacobson completed his studies at Fuller Theological Seminary and will receive a Master of Divinity degree. He is deeply thankful

for the support of the church and many of its members in enabling him to pursue this degree.

Unfortunately, our lives are often marked with pain and suffering. Alamo Heights United Methodist church seeks to offer comfort and care to those that need it. We look forward to another fruitful year loving our neighbors well when they need it the most.

Charge Conference Report 2022 Music and Worship Ministry

The purpose of the Music and Worship Ministry is to serve the congregation in weekly worship through art and music. Through the gifts of music, poetry, hymns, prayers, and visual art, we consider it our purpose to offer our gifts to enhance, deepen and expand the spoken word. It is our purpose and our joy.

During 2022 we experienced a change in our Senior Leadership with the departure of Holly Gotelli and the arrival of Jason Adams. The church has welcomed Jason, and he has brought a revived sense of energy and purpose to our staff and church.

We have continued to offer a variety of places for people to serve. We have dedicated members of Adult Choirs, Youth Choir, Children's Music, and Adult Handbells.

Some of the highlights of the year have included:

- a Children's Handbell Camp where 4<sup>th</sup> and 5th graders gathered on a Saturday to learn music and then played the next morning in worship.
- Our Holy Week experience involved the adult choirs, the youth choir and brass
  - Good Friday is a highlight of the Holy week experience as it is planned and led by our Youth Choir. The congregation finds great hope in seeing our youth serve in this way.
- Our annual Children's Music Camp in June brings in people from the community and the state.
   Percentage-wise, our outreach is about 60% of people do not attend Alamo Heights UMC, and 40% do.
- The Youth Choir was able to take its first mission trip since COVID. They traveled to Mountain Home, Arkansas, where they worked at the homes of people in the community and the local food bank. They also delivered school supplies that the AHUMC VBS collected as their mission project to a school community in Arkansas in need.
- We are in search of an Associate Director of Music. We have a wonderful bank of volunteers in the ministry that have stepped forward to fill in the gaps as we continue our search.
- Our music community continues to grow in all choirs, and we look forward to what the future holds.
- We added a staff member to our team, Vanessa Woodworth. She is our Program Coordinator. Her main role is the building and planning of the arts program mentioned below.

For 2023 we are excited about the plans for an Arts program that will offer an after-school arts alternative focused on students in the lower SES community of Alamo Heights. It will be open to all students in Grades 3-5. We will begin in the Fall of 2023 with an offering one day a week in hopes that as the years progress, it will grow into more grades and days and hopefully open to adult offerings as well. In our first year, we will offer classes in Handbells, Ukulele, Visual Arts, and Movement.

Participation in a musical ensemble provides a common space for people of varied ages, occupations, ethnicities, and theological views to join in a common purpose beyond themselves. Each Sunday, corporate worship offers the same opportunity for unity, encouragement, and community. It is our desire that as we practice our faith through worship and song, we grow as disciples of Jesus, making space for God's transformative work in our lives and having the courage to share our lives with others.

On December 3<sup>rd</sup>, we hosted our 2<sup>nd</sup> Festival de Navidad: A Night in Bethlehem welcoming more than 500 guests to our church. We transformed our parking lot into a street in ancient Bethlehem with 11 different shops for families to visit. Volunteers wore biblical costumes and greeted families in their shops. The kids were able to "fish", paint, visit a spice shop and a bakery, make jewelry, and hear from the InnKeepers that offered their stable to Mary and Joseph that very special night. Families were able to enjoy hot chocolate while watching 2 performances of our Live Nativity. We are so grateful to the volunteers that helped make this night so special!

## 2022 Charge Conference Report AHUMC Weekday School

The AHUMC Weekday School is a growing and thriving pre-school where young children are loved and appreciated. Our focus and mission is to teach these young children the Love of God and to encourage them to share that love with everyone they meet! We start each day with chapel in the Sanctuary learning about God and His love for each of us. We spend our time in chapel singing praise songs, hearing bible stories, practicing our monthly bible verse, and praying. This year we have been richly blessed with Pastor Jason Adams joining us every Wednesday to lead our chapel time. The children and families regularly share how impactful his lessons and stories are for the children each Wednesday.

We love, care for, and educate children 6 weeks old to 5 years old. This year our numbers have grown, and we are excited to have 140 children enrolled at the school and from those children we serve 119 families. We have roughly 83 children attend each day, Monday through Friday. There are 24 staff members of the Weekday School, many of whom have worked here for over 10 years. This fall we were blessed to add 4 certified early childhood educators to our staff who all have 10 years or more experience working in public education educating young children.

The Weekday School started updating and refreshing our rooms and facilities this year. We have painted all classrooms and most hallways and will have the remaining hallways painted and completed this month. We are working to refresh the children's library space to enhance the children's experience when visiting the library and hope to include Godly Play curriculum into the space in the coming months. This year we adopted "The Creative Curriculum" from Teaching Strategies as a classroom curriculum for teachers to use. This curriculum includes lesson plans, books, digital content, circle time activities and more for children from birth to 5 years old. The Weekday School is also excited about a major playground renovation we have initiated. Supplies have been ordered and are planned to ship soon to include outdoor musical instruments, areas to paint and create, as well as extended track surfaces and new tricycles and cars for children to ride. We are also expanding our Toddler Porch area to include more opportunities for our Toddlers and young learners to play, grow, and learn. Another area we have developed is parent involvement in the classroom. We have parents coming on campus as special guest readers, center time helpers, small group leaders, and helping with class celebrations.

Another celebration from this year is our partnership with Juniper Village, a retirement home next door. Our Pre-School children and teachers take field trips each month to visit with residents throughout the year! We have visited with them for Grandparents Day, Halloween, Thanksgiving, and Christmas.

As we move into 2023, we are looking forward to continued growth and expanding our school to meet the needs of the community we serve. We are excited to continue our mission of sharing the love of God with the children and families we serve, while educating the children for their future.

## 2022 Church Conference Report CLC Worship Band

As the worship director for the CLC service, I have been blessed by seeing the flexibility and growth with the band consdering the pastoral change this year. The addition of Robert Ortiz to the pastoral team is a blessing to us and the CLC community. We are excited about what's to come in 2023.

Like every year, one of my main goals is to recruit and develop new worship team members. I was able to recruit three new musicians. Jason Smith, Wendy Taylor, and Chris Estus now serve in the band. Given the reality of how difficult it is to recruit volunteers, this is a huge success. It is always a priority for me to be available and present for all band members, new and established, to provide growth opportunities in their role.

We began using studio production tracks in 2020 due to limitations caused by the pandemic. Production tracks are musical beds of different instrumentation digitally created and played live to support a band. It is now a yearly goal to continue to create and write these tracks that are used in worship weekly. It requires a lot of time to arrange and record these types of production. Production tracks have been an area of extraordinary growth for the band. We have acquired the tools and training to program tracks for every worship song and have gone to great lengths in self-education to do so. Those tracks have sustained the worship band in the CLC to present day.

The CLC Worship team has performed extraordinarily in 2022 and continues to put forth their diligent efforts allowing us to create a worship space that calls people from all walks of life, giving them a safe place to be who they are called to be. We are lucky to have this team and I am blessed to serve alongside them.
